



# 1. Source analysis task

This was published on 9 December 1949 by the Melbourne Herald newspaper the night before the election on 10 December 1949. Once completed with the article:

work in pairs to complete the table by identifying:

- At least one key belief which Menzies had about socialism in Australia.
- At least two arguments made by Menzies to persuade people to vote for the Liberal party.
- Include direct evidence from the article, i.e., the exact words used by Menzies. (Quote him!).

### 2. Research Task

Read the information under the heading 'The 1951 referendum' and conduct independent research on the topic and then complete ONE of the following activities:

# Α.

- Create a 'YES' vote and a 'NO' vote poster for each side of the referendum campaign.
- Present posters to the class, explaining the elements of each poster to persuade the viewers to vote either 'YES' or 'NO.'

## B.

- Form two groups, one 'Yes' group and one 'NO' group.
- Everyone make a simple 'protest rally' style sign which shows what they think is the most compelling reason to vote yes or no, depending on the group.
- In each group work together to write a campaign speech for one person to deliver, arguing for their position in the referendum.
- While they deliver the speech, other members stand behind them with the protest signs and support them with cheers and applause.





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
